As the debate over the best residential work for 2008 actualises into the *Royal Australian Institute of Architects* chapter awards, we map the nation's architectural mood with a SURVEY SHOW of each state's short lists.



AT A GEOGRAPHIC glance exuberant form continues to be curbed in city centres, where issues of privacy and heritage protection are shifting shape-makers to the coast and turning façades into both the incubator of building intelligence and the canvas of creativity. But the cross-continent commonality stops there which, in a design world driven by the homogenising imperative of sustainability, is quite surprising, for Aussie architecture's response to the universal remains doggedly regional. Up north the 'back to basics' view on climate control presents in refined rectilinear forms whose scale and fine-stick façadism reflect expansive rural locales. This up-front naturalism is neutered in NSW where strict inner-city prescriptions are forcing a love of the forest back inside. While the southern state factions of mathematical expressionism and sharp-suited modernism (made interesting with graffiti sprays, tattoos and the architectural equivalent of the shoulder pad, big cantilevers) go head to head, Tasmania, with its 'look at it, not me' mindset, slips shapes quietly into the landscape. West Australia does the same disappearing act save for a wacky roof-line that waves to east counterparts for attention. Watch this space for news of the single scheme that garners the nation's top residential prize - the Robin Boyd Award. ANNEMARIE KIELY
